To what extent should we embrace an ideology?	You <u>must</u> be able to understand, assess and respond to the complexities of ideologies.

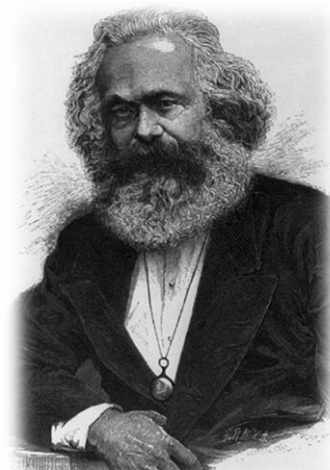
FOUR RELATED ISSUES:

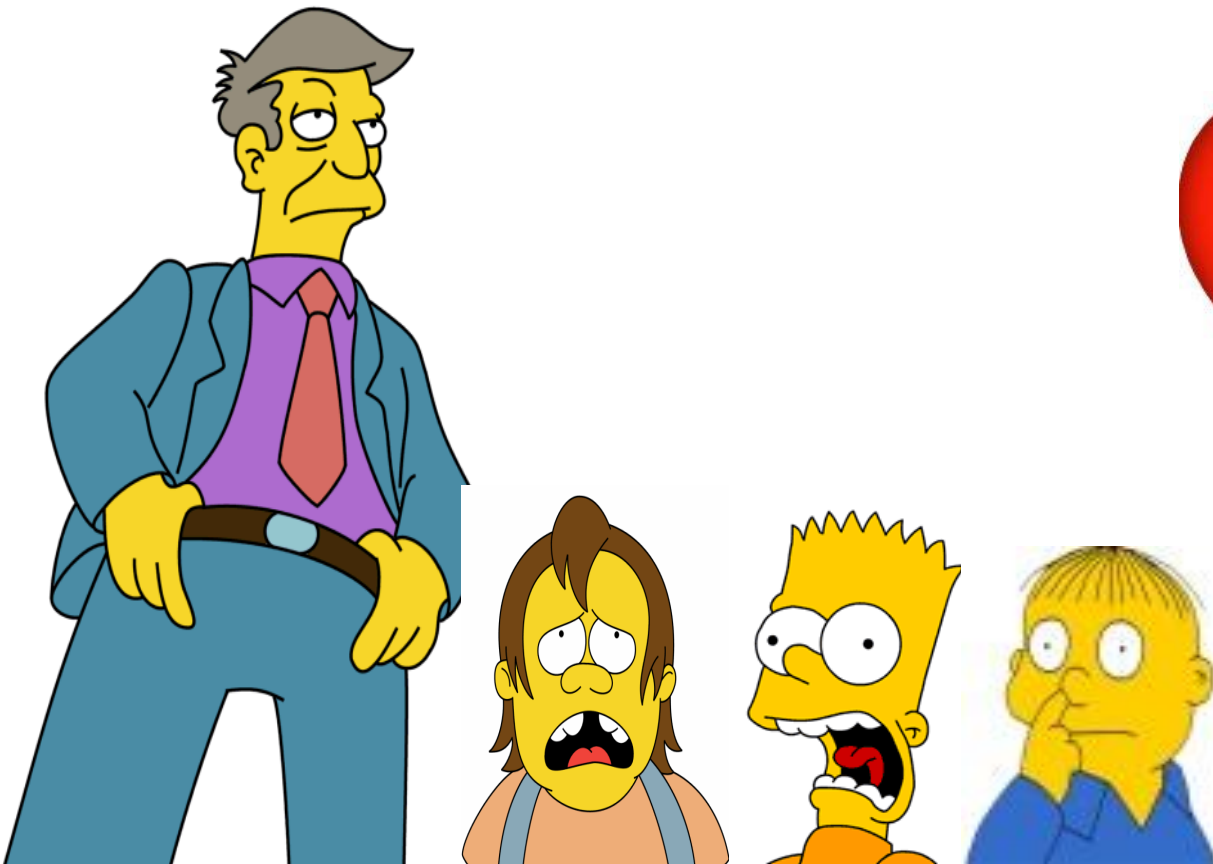
